
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A plan for Ongar



High Ongar

The Problem

- Ongar is a small country town; in effect a one street settlement.
- The villages within Ongar's sphere of influence are going to grow.
- · Fyfield Business Park is to be developed.
- Ongar itself will grow.
- As a result Ongar cannot remain a one street town.
- Development north of the A414 in Shelley and south of Marden Ash would turn Ongar into a dumbbell shaped settlement, exacerbating traffic and parking problems in the town centre.

Solutions

- · A relief road/ bypass to be constructed east of Ongar joining at A414 and A128.
- Residential development in Area C of EFDC's plan. Housing would be within walking distance of the High St and public transport, including the Epping/ Ongar railway.
- A car park to be constructed to the immediate north of the castle, serving the High St and Q.E.2 Sports Ground.
- · No vehicular link between these developments and the High St at any point.
- Alternatively, or in addition depending on requirements, a western relief road/ bypass to be constructed linking the A414 Epping Road to the Greensted Road west of the Borough.
- · Housing to be constructed in EFDC's Area F, above the flood plain of the Cripsey Brook.
- · Car parking opposite Banson's Lane, affording pedestrian access to the High Street.
- New homes would be within walking distance of the High St., public transport and Ongar Primary School.
- Again no vehicular link to the High St.

Consequences

- Ongar grows in a limited and manageable way.
- The High Street's traffic and parking problems would be solved.
- · The town doesn't sprawl into the open countryside. The development would be in effect infilling, producing a more nucleated and cohesive settlement.
- · There would be the minimum violation of the concept of the Green Belt."
